WEST YELLOWSTONE SEEKS FEEDBACK ON NEW HOUSING STRATEGY PLAN

The West Yellowstone community has taken an important step towards addressing its housing challenges with the release of the first draft of the West Yellowstone Housing Strategy Plan. This initiative, spearheaded by a dedicated group of community members, aims to tackle the town's pressing housing issues and create a sustainable framework for future development.

The West Yellowstone Housing Coalition, after completing a Housing Needs Assessment in June, has collaborated with an ad hoc Housing Strategy Group to develop this comprehensive plan. The drafting process involved a diverse group of contributors, including renters, homeowners, council members, individuals in job-attached housing, and employees from the education and government sectors. The project has been facilitated by the Human Resource Development Council (HRDC) and the West Yellowstone Foundation, with funding support from the Montana Healthcare Foundation.

The draft of the Housing Strategy Plan identifies several key goals to address the community's housing needs:

- Creating Affordable Housing Options: Implementing tools like community land trusts, deed restrictions, and the use of publicly-owned land to develop affordable housing.
- Expanding Housing Supply: Increasing residential zoning and exploring the potential of manufactured housing and mobile homes.
- Ensuring Long-term Sustainability: Establishing dedicated funding sources and leveraging publicprivate partnerships to maintain housing affordability over time.

 Addressing Immediate Needs: Using land banking and other strategic initiatives to quickly respond to urgent housing demands.

Guided by the principles that housing should be safe, clean, modern, secure, attainable, and dependable, the plan emphasizes the importance of diverse housing options for the workforce and long-term residents. It highlights the necessity of encouraging affordability in existing housing and expanding the housing stock for individuals who wish to live and contribute to West Yellowstone. Community engagement, education, and buy-in are deemed critical to changing the current housing momentum in the area. The plan outlines seven priority tools to achieve these goals:

- 1.Community Land Trust: Establishing a trust to manage land specifically for affordable housing development.
- 2.Deed Restrictions: Implementing restrictions to ensure long-term affordability of housing units.
- 3. Using Publicly-Owned Land for Affordable Housing: Leveraging publicly-owned land to develop housing that meets community needs.
- 4. Manufactured Housing and Mobile Homes: Promoting the use of manufactured housing and mobile homes as affordable options.
- 5. Land Banking: Acquiring and holding land for future housing development to ensure a steady supply.
- 6. Dedicated Funding Sources for Affordable Housing: Identifying and securing consistent funding to support affordable housing initiatives.
- 7.Increased Residential Zoning: Adjusting zoning regulations to allow for more residential development and higher density housing.



WEST YELLOWSTONE FIREFIGHTER SAFETY TIPS: CAMPFIRE SAFETY

In the United States nearly nine out of 10 wildfires are caused by people not being careful. Let's help our friend Smokey the Bear prevent these types of fires by learning to be careful and helping others do the same.

- Make sure you are at a site that allows campfires.
- Use a designated fire pit or fire ring.
- Make sure there are no burn bans and it's not too windy.
- Never leave a campfire unattended.
- Keep a bucket of water and shovel near by.
- Do not sit on the fire ring or rocks around a campfire. They heat up quickly and they'll stay hot for a long time.
- Build campfires at least 25 feet away from tents, shrubs, and anything that can burn.
- Closely watch children around campfires, greater than 80% of campfire related pediatric injuries were caused by day old campfires.
- When it's time to put the fire out, dump lots of water on it, stir it with a shovel, then dump more water on it. Make sure it is COLD before leaving the campsite. If it's too hot to touch, it's too hot to leave.

HEBGEN BASIN HOSPITAL DISTRICT FOCUSES THEIR EFFORTS TOWARDS A FEASIBILITY STUDY

The Hebgen Basin Hospital District was created by the support of voters in 2023 and is located in the southernmost part of Gallatin County, Montana which includes the Town of West Yellowstone, the only town/city located within its roughly 120 square mile footprint. The District was formed for the purpose of exploring options to expand medical services for residents within the District as well as the large number of visitors that frequent the Town of West Yellowstone and Yellowstone National Park annually. Over 1,200 residents call West Yellowstone home although the population within the District can swell to over 16,000 daily during the peak summer months when visitors flock to the area to enjoy the area's abundant recreational opportunities. The District is currently in the process of soliciting funds to commission Feasibility Study that will provide a needs and cost-based analysis of the type of medical facility that will best serve the West Yellowstone community and its year-round visitors. The District is comprised of a five-member elected board that currently includes the following individuals:

Bob Kinney, a relatively new resident to the area, is the District's Board Chair and is a retired investment banker whose career involved financing public infrastructure projects across the country. After raising a family in Connecticut, he and his wife moved to Utah and then to West Yellowstone after multiple visits and falling in love with the area.

Doug Schmier, a life-long resident of West Yellowstone, currently serves as the District's Vice-Chair. He is well known as a businessman in town and actively serves on a variety of boards in addition to his service on the District's Board.

Becky Goltz, is a registered nurse who has lived and worked in this community for over twelve years and serves currently as the District's Board Secretary/Clerk. Becky has worked as an EMT in our community; she is



also a licensed x-ray technician and has worked at our local clinic since June of 2014. Becky has also, worked in other communities across Montana doing long term care, emergency department nursing and medical surgical nursing. Becky has served on other boards including the Great Falls College Nursing Advisory Board and the West Yellowstone Medical Center Inc.

Kenny Jones has been a resident of West Yellowstone for 3 ½ years having moved here from Jackson Wyoming and is a native of Wyoming. Kenny has spent 49 years in the healthcare industry with 22 years as an owner of a healthcare services company that included operating an Emergency Medical Service that provided services to NASA at Johnson Space Center and managing the clinic where all members of the human space flight program received medical care. "I am an empowering leader with a proven track record for success in managing multiple projects. I have a full range of experiences including budget preparation, competitive procurements, contract administration, and business development."

Nancy Meyer is the Board's newest member having been elected in May 2024. Nancy is a registered nurse currently licensed in MT. Nancy's nursing experience includes emergency department (ED) nursing at Ohio State University for 3 years, the ED at St Luke's Magic Valley in Twin Falls, ID for 20 years and being a Flight Nurse at St Alphonsus Lifeflight in Boise/Twin Falls and Air St Luke's Twin Falls for total 15 years. Nancy is very much looking forward to participating as a Trustee of the Hebgen Basin Hospital District and supporting the community with additional health care.

65TH ANNIVERSARY OF EARTHQUAKE LAKE AND SMOKEY THE BEAR'S 80TH BIRTHDAY

What do Smokey Bear and Earthquake Lake have in common? An artist! Smokey Bear was introduced to the US Forest Service's Forest Fire Prevention campaign in 1944. The campaign was created in an effort to minimize forest fires during World War II as many resources, including firefighters, were being directed towards the war. Turning 80 years old this year, Smokey Bear is part of the longest-running public service announcement campaign in the United States.

Throughout his 80-year career, many artists have had a hand in creating Smokey's evolving image. Rudolph "Rudy" Wendelin is among the most well-known of these artists. Rudy took over as the official artist of Smokey Bear in 1949 and continued in this role for decades.

During his time working for the Forest Service, Rudy Wendelin visited some of America's most incredible public lands. One such opportunity was a tour of national forests in the American west in 1971. He visited several sites including Medicine Bow National Forest, Shoshone National Forest, Flathead National Forest, Bighorn National Forest, and Gallatin National Forest. While on Gallatin National Forest, Rudy visited Earthquake Lake and created four beautiful watercolors of the area featuring Earthquake Lake, the Madison Slide, the remains of Hilgard Lodge, and Memorial Boulder.

This August, we are looking forward to displaying Rudy Wendelin's Smokey Bear artwork and three of the Earthquake Lake watercolors at Earthquake Lake Visitor Center and the West Yellowstone Visitor Information Center. This artwork exhibit will be part of many exciting activities happening in the month of August as we remember the 65th anniversary of Earthquake Lake and celebrate the 80th birthday of Smokey Bear. Our schedule of events is as follows:

- Friday, August 9th, 2024: Join us at the West Yellowstone Visitor Information Center as we celebrate Smokey's actual birthday.
- August 12th-23rd, 2024: Rudy Wendelin's artwork will be on display throughout this period. Four pieces will be on display at the West Yellowstone Visitor Information Center and the remaining pieces will be on display at Earthquake Lake Visitor Center.
- Saturday, August 17th, 2024: Earthquake survivor Anita Painter Thon will share her experience, and Mike Stickney, Director of Earthquake Studies at Montana Tech, will present on the 1959 Hebgen Lake Earthquake. Both programs will take place at Earthquake Lake Visitor Center.
- Sunday, August 18th, 2024: The smokejumpers will jump at Refuge Point (depending on smokejumper availability). At Earthquake Lake Visitor Center, there will be presentations by earthquake survivor John Owen and geologist Jamie Farrell, Department of Geology & Geophysics at the University of Utah.

Other activities the weekend of August 16th include a Morning Landslide Walk led by Joanne Girvin, guided hikes at Refuge Point, sidewalk chalk artists at Earthquake Lake Visitor Center, hands-on geology activities for kids, and more. AUGUST 3: 54TH ANNUAL ROD RUN




The 54th annual Rod Run is happening at Pioneer Park. Coming back this year is the parade happening at 9 am on Saturday, August 3rd. Followed by the "Show 'n' Shine" from 10 am - 3 pm on Saturday. This is a family-friendly event.

AUGUST 3: LEWIS THE LLAMA AT THE BOOK PEDDLER

Lewis the Llama is coming to the Book Peddler on August 3rd from 2 pm - 5 pm. Lewis was lost in Yellowstone but has survived to tell his tale. Stop by and visit Lewis the llama. This is a family-friendly event.





MADISON RIVER

Madison River in Montana is still going strong as long as you're fishing above Ennis. The waters below town are in Hoot Owl restrictions which means you are only allowed to fish from sunrise until 2 pm and then by law have to quit fishing. From Earthquake Lake down to Ennis is still good to go all day. Size 14-16 mayfly spinners, missing link caddis have been great bugs to throw if you are looking for the dry fly game and if you want to go down to them, I recommend size 16-18 crystal dips, shop vacs, bullet quill, Spanish bullet or zebra midges under a big hopper dry fly or an indicator. The fish are getting more educated every day so getting a shorter cast with a clean drift will be more important than anything.

HEBGEN LAKE

Hebgen Lake and Earthquake Lake are starting to get going on the dry fly game. Decent numbers of Callibaetis on Hebgen Lake. A 14-16 Callibaetis hackle stacker or rusty spinner should get them to come up and check out your dry. There are still a few PMD's flying around Quake Lake and fish working good. 16-18 PMD sparkle flag and an 18 rusty spinner would be in my box when heading to the lake. If you're having trouble finding fish working on dries, I would blind cast a leech through the trees on Quake or the weed mats on Hebgen and just fish all the good looking water.

FISHING HEAT ADVISORY

As we are getting into the heat of the summer, the water temps are also heating up so be careful where you fish. Try to fish the coldest water possible and really try to limit the fish being out of water as much as possible. It's okay to take a couple pictures but prolonged exposure to them being out of the water can make their recovery harder and more risk of not making it.




YELLOWSTONE

The Firehole, Madison and Gibbon River below Norris Junction are all closed off right now due to hot water temps and shall not be fished. Don't worry as there are plenty of other waters in the park that are fishable and doing great. The NE corner of the park is just getting good and plenty of nice Yellowstone Cutthroat looking up for flies. Small mayflies and caddis as well as attractor pattern will have them looking up. You may have to get off the beaten path a little to get away from some of the crowds but the hike is always worth it. Just remember to take bear spray with you and check the YNP's latest fishing regulations!

IDAHO

The Henry's Fork in Idaho is big right now with about 1700 CFS coming out of Island Park Reservoir but there is still some fishing to be had. Look for Golden Stones sporadically coming off in the Box Canyon. Two nymphs under an indicator is always a great way to find fish in the box and just look in all the slicks behind the rocks and in between the weed mats. Warm River to Jump-off is a fun float to do if you're not being too serious about the fishing, it will be more of a fun day with lots of recreational floaters but still plenty of fish to be found throwing 2 nymphs under an indicator with some extra weight to get down in the fast heavy water. If you want to stay on foot, then I would try walking the ranch look for some of those big rainbows laid up eating caddis and drake spinners. Don't be in a rush as some of them are sneaky and laid up close to the banks, you may just walk right by them so look hard and go slow.
